Rome: Pope Francis prayed the Angelus on Sunday with pilgrims in St. Peter's Square, and reflected on the day's Gospel (Mk 5:21-42). The Pope said Jesus encounters two dramatic situations in this passage, which speak to us about death and disease. "Jesus lets Himself be touched by our suffering and our death," he said, "and He works two signs of healing to tell us that neither suffering nor death have the last word.'

Health and affections

Since illness is still at the centre of our attention due to the pandemic, Pope Francis focused his remarks especially on the healing of the woman with haemorrhages.

"More than her health," he noted, "her affections were compromised: she had blood loss and therefore, according to the mindset of the time, she was deemed impure.

Pope at Angelus: Jesus heals our hearts wounded from lack of love

At the Angelus address on Sunday, Pope Francis recalls that Jesus goes beyond our sins and prejudices to heal our heart from the wounds and mistakes of the past.

All this meant that she was Seeking Jesus' healing gaze marginalized and left without the possibility of a husband or a family. "She lived alone, with a wounded heart."

The Pope pointed out that the "most serious illness in life is a lack of love, and not being able to love.

Useless searching for love

He then reflected on how we can find healing in this story of a nameless woman who represents us all. She had spent lots of money on various ineffective treatments which only made her condition worse. The Pope lamented that we, too, seek useless remedies for our lack of love, throwing ourselves into vain searches for success and money, even looking online. But, he added, the woman finally chose to seek direct, physical contact with Jesus.

"The Lord waits for us to encounter Him," said the Pope, "to open our hearts to Him, for us, like the woman, to touch His garment in order to heal. Because, by growing in intimacy with Jesus, we are healed in our affections."

Pope Francis pointed out that Jesus responds favorably to the woman's touch, seeking her out of the pressing crowd.

This is Jesus' gaze: there are many people, but He goes in search of a face and a heart full of faith. He does not look at the whole, but at the individual."

The Pope added that Jesus "does not stop at the wounds and mistakes of the past, but goes beyond sins and prejudices" to reach the heart. Jesus, he said, heals precisely that woman who had been rejected by everyone, praising her faith and calling her "daughter".

Love alone heals life

Finally, Pope Francis encouraged everyone to "let Jesus look at and heal your heart." If we have already experienced His gaze, then we should turn to those around us who may feel wounded and alone to show them love.

"Jesus asks you for a gaze that does not stop at the outward appearance, but that goes to the heart: a gaze not judgmental, but welcoming," he said, "Because love alone heals life."

The Creed: I Believe in the Holy Spirit

Many things can be said about the Holy Spirit, but we will only talk about the benefits that come to us from him. St Thomas Aquinas talks about five benefits:

1) He cleanses us from our sins. It is necessary that the hearts of men, destroyed by sin, be made anew by the Holy Spirit: "Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created; and You shall renew the face of the earth." (Ps 103:30). Nor is it any wonder that the Spirit cleanses, since all sins are taken away by love: "Charity covers a multitude of sins." (1 Pt 4:8)

2) The Holy Spirit enlightens the intellect, since all that we know, we know through the Holy Spirit: "But the Paraclete, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things and bring all things to your mind, whatsoever I shall have said to you." (Jn 14:26)

3) He assists us and, to a certain extent, compels us to keep the commandments. No one can keep the commandments unless he loves God: "If any one loves Me, he will keep My word." (Jn 14:23). Thus, the Holy Spirit makes us love God: "And I will give to you a new heart, and I will place in you a new spirit... And I will place my Spirit in your midst. And I will act so that you may walk in my precepts and keep my judgments." (Ez 36:26-27)

In the last issue we saw the top 4 Coordinators. These programs should include teaching of challenges in the Catholic Church and the 4 possible solutions. We can reflect on the next 4 challenges and possible solutions.

5. Catholic Children lack faith-formation in: Catholic Religious Education, Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE), Sunday School and Altar boys/girls. The possible solutions are: a well-coordinated program for Sunday School, ECCE and altar boys/girls. It is highly recommended that every diocese and indeed every parish should have a Missionary Childhood program (Children helping Children).

In the diocese of Wabag, Children within the ages of 3-12 years, come together on Friday evening and stay overnight in the village houses supervised by some parents. They leave in the evening of Saturday. During this time, they learn catechism, prayers, Bible stories, liturgical songs and dances, talent-building-activities and values for good living.

In the following years more than 600 were convinced or forced to return home, almost 500 were resettled in the United States and a few other countries, 8 have died (4 by suicide), about 300 are in Australia where they were temporary transferred on medical grounds, 126 remain in Papua New Guinea, almost all of them in Port Moresby.

Of these 126 individuals, all males, about a half are still being processed for resettlement to the US, to Canada or to other countries. But approval is not certain. Half a dozen are considering remaining in Papua New Guinea. For the rest, perhaps 60 or 70 of them, there is still no solution in sight.

It is therefore realistic to think that the final push for the solution of the remaining caseload in Port Moresby, in Nauru (the second Pacific island for offshore detention), and Australia (for those temporarily transferred over the years for medical reasons) is postponed to the second half of the year 2022. But it is imperative that by that time all other available options (USA, Canada, Papua New Guinea and other third countries) are exhausted and There is too much at stake now for the Australian only the men and women who could not be resettle

It was encouraging for us at the Bishops Conference to be invited for the first time at the end of May to discuss these issues with both the governments of Australia and Papua New Guinea, though still at an executive level. We positively registered their willingness not to leave anybody behind when the afore mentioned resettlement options are completed.

But that will mean for Australia accepting the long-standing New Zealand offer to welcome some of the refugees, and for Australia to make reasonable exceptions to the legislation preventing anybody arrived in the country by boat after 19 July 2013 to be resettled there.

After all these men and women, simply caught in the system, have served a paramount Australian national interest.

They have been sacrificed for years to permanently deter the boats and the people smugglers. Many of them got sick; 14 so far died in the process in Manus, Nauru, and Australia.

Those still surviving and with nowhere to go deserve a space in Australia. Sooner rather than later.

Facilitated by the Social Communications Commission (SOCOM) of the Catholic Bishops Conference (CBC), the purpose of the program was to empower youths with the knowledge to make confident decisions when faced with life choices.

Young people on media and life relationships

The program had four dynamic young women as facilitators. They shared on how the media has distorted and manipulated their values, attitudes, relationships and faith.

The first session had Esther Aigilo, a young parishioner from St Joseph's parish, speak on meaningful friendships and its associated values. She also dwelt on how social media has defined friendships today.

Infatuation was the second topic that was presented by SOCOM personnel, Jessica Oata.

In this session, she highlighted the traits and outcomes of a person infatuated by another. She also emphasized on the need for young people to channel their zeal, energy and talent into things that are creative.

The third topic on love was presented by SOCOM personnel, Isabella Saleu. She dwelt on the qualities of love, the Sacrament of Marriage and spreading love through the different media platforms.

Exploitation in relationships was the final topic presented by St Joseph's parishioner, Carol Aigilo. In the light of recent events at the University of Papua New Guinea, she highlighted male domination, physical and emotional abuse. She spoke on getting convicted by the law when relationships are exploited and on it being destructive to any relationship.

The participants had the possibility to discuss gender-based violence in PNG and the importance of teaching or raising children to equality and respect of women at home.

'I haven't had the privilege to talk about relationships openly with my family and this program has given me a lot to reflect upon," said Juliette Dawa, a participant from DBTI.

Rabaul: The Right Relationship in Ministry (RRM) of the Catholic Bishops Conference had its second Regional Workshop for Contact persons of the New Guinea Islands Region.
