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Pope at Easter Vigil: With Jesus, no tomb will suppress the joy of life'

At the Vigil Mass in the Holy Night of Easter in St. Peter's Basilica, Pope Francis been rolled back, revealing God's power: "the victory of life over death, the invites us to "look up" to Jesus, the God of life, and reminds us that by welcoming triumph of light over darkness, the rebirth of hope amid the ruins of failure." reflected on the Gospel account of the women visiting the empty tomb of Jesus, deaths, the eternal life that he came to bring is even now present in our midst. drawing attention to two crucial moments of that event. At first the grieved women are troubled by a question: "Who will roll away the stone from the tomb?".

"That stone, an overwhelming obstacle," said the Pope, "symbolized what the women felt in their hearts. It represented the end of their hopes, now dashed by the obscure and sorrowful mystery that put an end to their dreams."

The tombstones we encounter in our lives: Sometimes in life, the Pope observed, we too experience this feeling of being overwhelmed by sorrow and despair: "We encounter these tombstones in the emptiness left by the death of our loved ones, in the failures and fears that hold us back from accomplishing the good we mean to do", but also "in all the forms of self-absorption that stifle our impulses to generosity and sincere love, in the rubber walls of selfishness and indifference that hold us back in the effort to build more just and humane cities and societies, in all our aspirations for peace that are shattered by cruel hatred and the brutality of war."

Holy Cross Sunday school children find healing and hope in trauma session

Honiara: On Saturday, the 2nd of March 2024. Holy Cross Cathedral witnessed a remarkable event as children aged 8 to 13 from the Sunday School program gathered for a special trauma healing session following the opening mass of the Sunday school year. The session, held at the Holy Cross Stage, aimed to address the emotional wounds of children who feel neglected in their homes.

Led by Sunday School Coordinator Mrs. Lilian Kwa'nairara, assisted by dedicated Holy Cross Sunday School teachers, the session explored into the theme "I Am Important." Through powerful stories, the children were guided to understand their significance in the eyes of God and society.

The first story narrated the modern-day experiences of Shammy and Rose, children who felt neglected by their parents. The second story drew from the Book of Genesis, emphasizing how God

Vitalyn Risimora, a Sunday school student, said, "From the two trauma healing sessions, I realize and I feel God is with me, and I am a child of God. I will go

Mrs. Lilian Kwa'nairara, reflecting on the session highlighted the concerning trend of children feeling ignored in society. She stressed the need for children to have the freedom to express themselves, receive education, and pursue their aspirations.

Mrs. Lilian announced plans to invite parents and quardians for a trauma healing session next month, recognizing the vital role families play in nurturing the emotional well-being of children.

The initiative undertaken by Holy Cross Cathedral reflects a collective effort to address the emotional needs of children, emphasizing their significance and fostering a supportive environment within the community.
